

Welcome! This course will introduce you to the diverse field of Psychology. We will cover a wide range of topics this semester, including historical foundations, scientific methodology and professional ethics, biological foundations, sensory and perceptual processes, consciousness, psychoactive drugs, learning, memory, thinking, intelligence and language, development, sexuality and gender, social influences, motivation, emotion and personality, and psychological disorders and their treatment.

Exams: There will be 3 exams throughout the semester. The 1st and 2nd exams will be given in class *and will not be cumulative*. The 3rd exam (the 'Final Exam') will be given during the final exam period, and will consist of material from the final 3rd of the class (~80%) *in addition to a smaller cumulative portion that will cover concepts from Exams 1 and 2 (~20%)*. The exams will collectively be worth **75% of your final grade (25% for each exam)**. Exam material may come from both the textbook readings and lectures, but *lecture material will always be emphasized!* All exams are closed book and you may not use any notes, dictionaries, or translating devices. No electronic devices may be on during exams (including laptops, cell phones, tablets, etc).

<u>Problem Sets:</u> A problem set consisting of 20 questions will be posted on CourseWorks ~1 week before each exam and must be completed by the specified date and time. The problem sets are meant to aid you in your study of the material and to provide examples of the kinds of questions you might see on an exam. You may use your text, lecture slides and class notes to help you answer the questions, *but by the due date you must answer (and submit) all of them correctly to receive full credit.* You may also discuss the questions with the Professor, TAs or your fellow students. Answers to the problem sets will be posted on CourseWorks after the due date. The problem sets will collectively be worth 15% of your final grade (5% each; 3 total).

<u>Research Participation</u>: There is a compulsory Psychology research requirement (6 credits; 30 mins per credit) for this course that will provide you with the opportunity to experience first-hand what happens in a Psychology empirical research study. Completing the research requirement will be worth 2.5% of your final grade. You may complete this requirement by participating in ongoing research studies in the Psychology Department that are posted online at <u>http://columbia.sona-systems.com/.</u> Additional details about this requirement and how to complete it will be provided in class and on CourseWorks. <u>NOTE</u>: You must be 18 years of age or older to participate in research studies. If you are not yet 18, please email the Professor at <u>ColumbiaIntroPsych@gmail.com</u> for an alternative way of completing this requirement.

<u>Written Assignments</u>: All students must complete two (2) written assignments of no more than 500 words each. The first assignment ('Written Assignment 1') will involve description of a piece of <u>non-academic</u> reporting on (or portrayal of) a topic that relates to academic Psychology and will be worth 5% of your final grade. The second assignment ('Written Assignment 2') will involve a description of <u>one</u> of your experience(s) with research participation and will be worth 2.5% of your final grade. Details of both assignments will be provided on CourseWorks (and in class) within the first week (or two) of the semester. *Students may complete the written assignments at any time after that, but both assignments must be completed by Friday April 5th, 2019 at 11:59pm*.

<u>CourseWorks:</u> All lecture templates, supplemental materials, class announcements and grades will be posted on CourseWorks: <u>https://courseworks.columbia.edu</u>. *Please make sure you are familiar with this online learning platform*.

<u>Make-ups</u>: Except for exceptional circumstances, *you will not be able to make up exams*. **Please look over the syllabus carefully before making any travel plans to determine whether you have a conflict with exam dates.** Pre-existing travel plans are not a good excuse for missing an exam. If you have a pre-existing travel conflict, please consider enrolling in a different section of Psych UN1001. *Under no circumstances will you will be allowed to make up problem sets or written assignments.*

<u>Attendance</u>: Because lecture material makes up most of the substance of the course, regular attendance in class is essential for successful performance in the course. *Not all lecture material is represented or well-explained on CourseWorks or in the text.* While attendance in class will not be a formal part of your final grade, *I strongly recommend that you always attend class!*

<u>Final grades</u>: Final grades will be determined as follows: **Exam 1 (25%)**, **Exam 2 (25%)**, **Final Exam (25%)**, **Problem Sets (15%; 5% each)**, **Written Assignment 1 (5%)**, **Written Assignment 2 (2.5%)**, **Research Participation (2.5%)**. Any accumulated extra credit will be averaged into your exam score average as described above (see 'Extra Credit iClicker Quizzes'). Letter grades will be assigned according to the following scale:
